Our mission is to enhance the quality of life for the people of the San Angelo area

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The intent of the Foundation is to remain in operation in perpetuity and to support community health in its broadest form.

For over twelve years the San Angelo Health Foundation has served San Angelo and our Concho Valley neighbors by supporting the efforts of local non-profit organizations and public entities.

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"Few people could have guessed that from the sale of one hospital could come so much good." Written in January 2000 for the <u>San Angelo Standard Times</u>, the statement holds true today. The ensuing years have produced more milestones for the San Angelo Health Foundation – grants exceeding \$32.5 million, dedication of permanent Foundation offices in the Visitor Center, and numerous Foundation initiatives benefitting area non-profits and community organizations.

Simply stated, we strive through Foundation initiatives and the grantmaking process to ensure opportunity and hope, particularly for those with limited resources and alternatives. In 2009 alone San Angelo Health Foundation committed \$2,307,507 to area non-profits. Significant grants benefitted the San Jacinto School-based Health Clinic, a new residential hospice program, river development projects in cooperation with the City of San Angelo, new facilities for a pregnancy help center and program funding for non-profits addressing mental health needs. Other 2009 awards detailed in this report provided facilities and equipment for emergency response and educational organizations, scholarships for higher education and capital improvements for animal protection programs.

Our ability to continue this rewarding work and strengthen our commitment to the San Angelo area relies on well-managed resources. The investment strategy adopted by the Foundation provides for stable long-term growth consistent with our planned grantmaking activities. The Trustees nurture existing relationships and foster new ones with our health care professionals, educators, nonprofit managers, community leaders and social service workers as we face a constantly changing and challenging environment.

I am honored to have served as Trustee since the Foundation was formed on the Audit, Executive, Investment, Grants and Nominating Committees, and as Chairman of the Board for the past four years. I look forward to serving with my long time friend and incoming Chairman Dr. Rob Patyrak. His caring and capable leadership will no doubt advance our overriding goal of improved quality of life for our citizens. Area organizations are encouraged to contact our foundation staff about funding for worthy projects.


FOUNDATION PROFILE






2009 Grants by Program Area Total Commitments \$2,307,507



Advisory Trustees


Appointed as a Trustee of Angelo Community Hospital in 1978 and as Trustee of the resulting Foundation in 1995, George Alexander served of Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the San Angelo Health Foundation and Chairman of the River Development Committee during the genesis of the Visitor Center project on the Concho River in downtown San Angelo. As a tireless advocate for San Angelo and West Texas, George forged relationships with community leaders and throughout our state through his involvement with Habitat for Humanity, Home Builders Association – Texas, Rio Concho Retirement Centers and Salvation Army. George is remembered for his uncanny sense of vision and methodical approach to complex issues. The Foundation has benefitted greatly from his contribution and service on our Executive, Grants, Investments and Nominating Committees. A scholarship to be awarded each year has been endowed by the San Angelo Health Foundation in his honor.





Sterling Gillis, M.D. has served on the Foundation Board of Trustees since 1995 and prior to that, on the Angelo Community Hospital Board since 1988. Certified by the American Board of Obstetrics and Gynecology, Dr. Gillis has practiced in San Angelo since 1963. He retired from full time practice in 1998, but continued to assist in surgery. For the past decade, Dr. Gillis has served as a physician supervisor over those providing care for the uninsured and underinsured women and patients at the Esperanza Health & Dental Centers.

Dr. Gillis was President of the Tom Green Eight County Medical Society in 1977 and was awarded the Golden Cane Award in 1998 for his outstanding contributions to medicine. He served as Chief of Staff of Angelo Community Hospital in 1979. He worked closely with Planned Parenthood for many years and was one of the founding members of the Moon Lectureship series at Angelo State University. He has been a long-standing member of First Presbyterian Church where he served as an Elder. We honor Dr. Gillis for his service on our Grants, Investments, River Development and Angelo State University Lectureship Committees. A scholarship to be awarded each year has been endowed by the San Angelo Health Foundation in his name.

Public institutions may also qualify if the grant requested is to be used exclusively for public purposes.

Organizations meeting the above guidelines may submit grant proposals that address an identifiable current need, demand or problem in the community that is defined and documented by the applicant organization. Applications are accepted on a continuing basis.
