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Financial Statement



About Us

The Community Foundation is a leader in philanthropy across the Mahoning Valley, working to match donors who care with causes that matter, while continually encouraging collaborative community efforts. The Community Foundation has provided grants in excess of \$12.6 million to approximately 300 charitable and educational institutions. Currently, the Foundation holds nearly \$19 million in assets. The Foundation also provides investment management, grantmaking and administrative services to over 80 donors and agencies. The Foundation has also received public support from over 800 individual donors.

Our History

The Community Foundation of the Mahoning Valley, a public charity, was incorporated in 1999 by five area trust companies and community partners, to address charitable and philanthropic needs across Mahoning and Trumbull Counties.

Our Mission

The Mission of the Foundation is to attract and invest permanent resources, with the purpose of enhancing the quality of life for the residents of the Mahoning Valley and future generations, in accordance with the charitable intentions of its donors.

To fulfill this mission, the Foundation will:

- Identify and support community based charitable purposes in the areas of health, education, economic development, human services, historical, cultural and environmental activities.
- Respond to community needs through philanthropic leadership, commitment, and compassion.
- Demonstrate accountability and integrity in the management of resources.

How to Apply for a Grant

Geographic Scope

The Foundation welcomes grant applications from eligible tax-exempt organizations under Internal Revenue Service 501(c)(3). Eligible organizations must be located within the Mahoning Valley Community (Mahoning and Trumbull Counties) as well as surrounding areas, or provide services contributing to the well being of the residents of the area.

Grant Intent

The Foundation is operated exclusively for charitable, educational and scientific purposes and for other charitable purposes, which at the absolute and uncontrolled discretion of the Board of Directors, effectively assist and promote the well being of the inhabitants of the Mahoning Valley Community.

All grants from the Foundation must be consistent with one or more of the following:

• Promoting education • Promoting scientific research for the advancement of human knowledge and the alleviation of human suffering • Caring for the sick, aged or hopeless • Caring for children Improving working and living conditions • Providing facilities for public recreation • For such other charitable purposes which will most effectively assist and promote the well being of the inhabitants of the Mahoning Valley Community

Types of Grants

Grants are most generally made for the following reasons:

- Program Support
- Project Support
- Capital Needs
- General Operating Support, under limited circumstances. Please consult the Foundation prior to making application in this category.

Application Process

Grant applications are considered quarterly. Applications may be requested by accessing our website at www.cfmv.org, or by calling the Foundation office at 330-743-5555.

Nonprofit Category Definitions

1. Arts, Culture, and Humanities:

Encompass museums, opera companies, symphony orchestra, theaters, libraries, etc. Primarily consist of community-based organizations.

- 2. Education: Consist of private nonprofit elementary, secondary, and post-secondary educational institutions, as well as organizations that provide educational services. Primarily local groups with affiliated national and international groups.
- 3. Environment and Animals: Focuses on programs that strive to improve local and national environments, cities, landscapes, etc. Also includes programs that provide services for animal welfare.
- 4. Health: Includes hospitals, clinics, nursing homes, and allied health care organizations. Primarily local groups controlled by local boards.
- 5. Human Services: Encompass a wide range of assistance to different population groups including elderly, homeless, etc. Primarily local, but many are affiliated with national and international parent organizations.
- 6. Public and Society Benefit: Focus on ways of strengthening communities in the areas of employment, economic development, housing, education, and healthcare. Primarily local grassroots organizations.
- 7. Other: Any organization that does not fit into one of the above catergories.

A Son's Legacy

Jeffrey Stevens was an amazing young man whose main love in life was his family and friends. After Jeffrey died unexpectedly in 2009, his parents Bob and Geri, and his sister Valerie struggled with how to best memorialize him.

Knowing he would always be remembered for his big heart and generosity to others, the Stevens family contacted our community foundation and soon established the Jeffrey M. Stevens Memorial Fund to benefit children who may be sick, disadvantaged and helpless. "Jeff always had a soft spot for children who had a problem or need", said Bob, "He always went out of his way to make children feel good about themselves."

Recently Jeff's restaurant paid tribute to their friend by donating all the proceeds from a special day of operation to his fund. The day was a tremendous success, thanks in large part to Ron Zenko, the restaurant's managing partner and Jeff's dear friend, the Stevens' friends and family, as well as the Foundation's professional development staff. Bob stated, "The response was so amazing, it has just been an incredible success, it's so heartwarming to know that the people in our

community could step up and do that."

The Stevens family says their "family has always felt a necessity to give," and the Foundation has helped them turn this vision into reality. "It's a blessing to have all of the guidance we've received from the staff at the Foundation. They allowed us to avoid the challenge of expense and time involved in



starting and maintaining a private foundation." Bob said he is grateful that through this fund "So many people who were part of Jeff's life are now able to be a part of his legacy."
